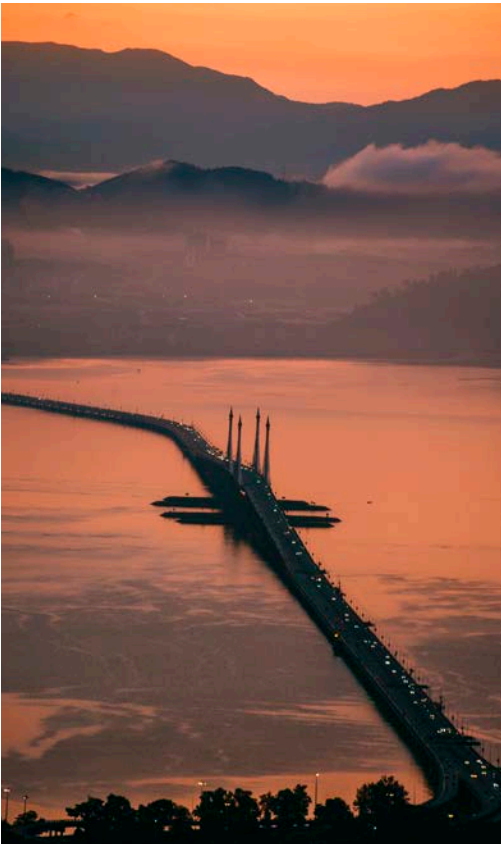

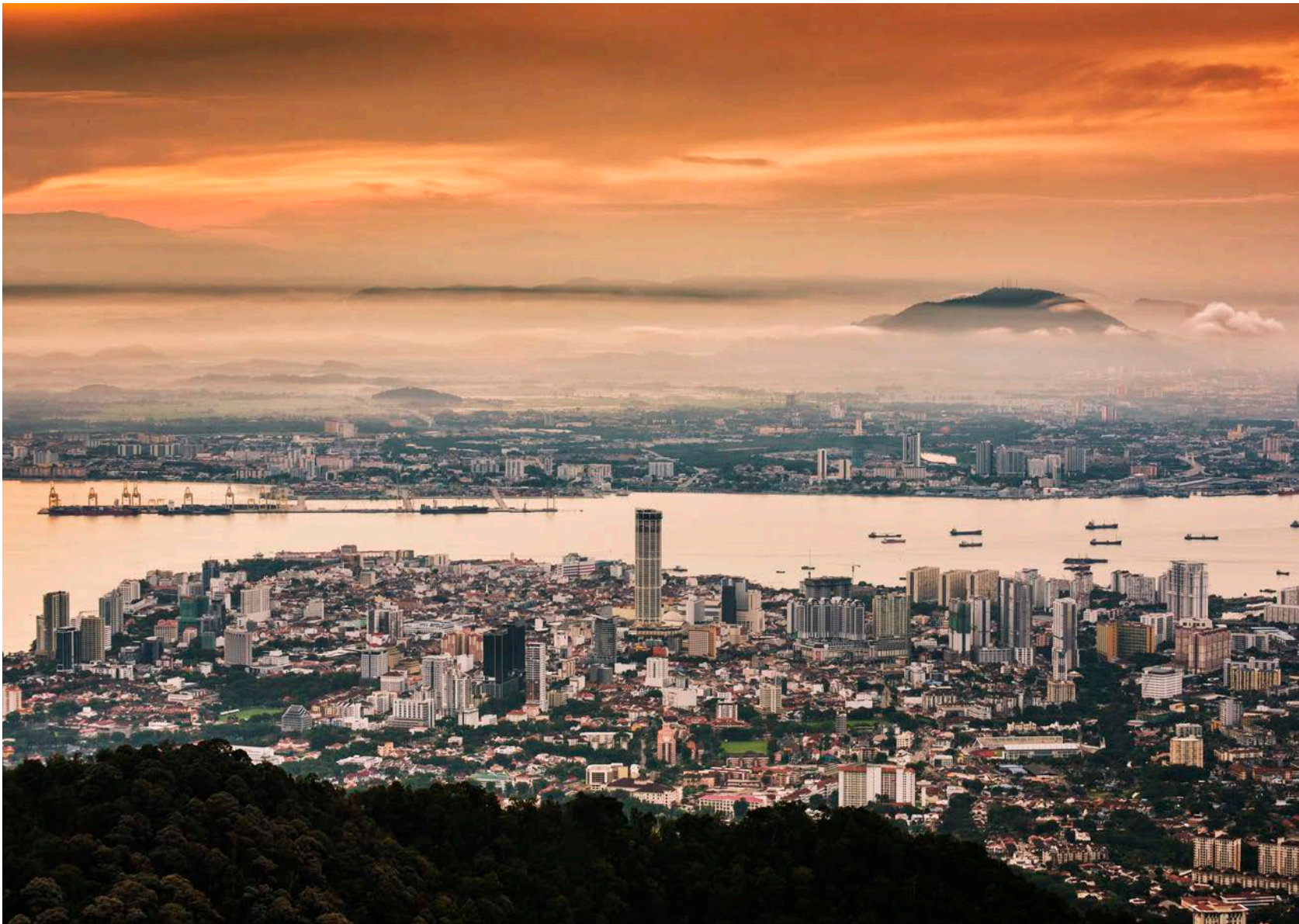

## ABOUT PENANG

Located on the northwest coast of Malaysia, Penang is home to renowned street food, a UNESCO World Heritage Site, gorgeous street art scene, year round festivals, world-class attractions and a UNESCO-designated 130-million-year-old ancient rainforest that's even older than the Amazon.



With its fantastic diversity in culture, heritage, arts, food, as well as its natural surroundings of lovely beaches and breathtaking hills, the state attracts millions of holiday-makers annually and has become one of the world's must-visit tourist destinations.

The vibrant state of **Penang comprises two halves: Penang Island**, where the capital city of George Town is located; and a strip of land on the peninsula, named **Seberang Perai**. In the northeast of the island lies the city of **George Town, a UNESCO World Heritage Site**. Much of the greener terrain is located on the island's hilly centre, which is home to the **Penang Hill UNESCO Biosphere Reserve**, and the mainland.

The narrow sandy beaches lined with resort hotels and residences span along Batu Ferringhi, Tanjung Bungah and Tanjung Tokong. On the southwest of Penang lies Balik Pulau, a scenic countryside. The Bayan Lepas Free Industrial Zone, located on the south-eastern tip of Penang, is known as the Silicon Valley of the East for its thriving industrial hub. Penang Island is connected by two bridges to Seberang Perai (or the 'mainland', and it is affectionately called in Penang). The main town in Seberang Perai is Butterworth, followed by Bukit Mertajam and Nibong Tebal.



Penang Island is a 20-minute ferry ride from Butterworth. There are two bridges connecting the island to the mainland: **Penang Bridge and the Second Penang Bridge** (Jambatan Sultan Abdul Halim Mu'adzam Shah). Penang International Airport sees incoming international flights from many countries such as China, Singapore, Thailand, Indonesia, Vietnam and Qatar.

Langkawi Island is a 2 hour 45 minute ferry ride away, or a short 35-minute flight. Malaysia's capital, Kuala Lumpur is a 50-minute flight away, or can alternatively be reached by a four-hour train or car ride.

Kota Kinabalu, the state capital of Sabah, can be reached by flight in 2 hour and 40 minutes.

## GETTING TO PENANG



### CONNECTIVITY

Foreign travellers generally board connecting flights to Penang from two main airports operating in Sepang - KLIA (Kuala Lumpur International Airport) and KLIA2 (Kuala Lumpur International Airport 2), and another in the city - the Sultan Abdul Aziz Shah Airport in Subang. Domestic flights are also widely available for visitors to fly to Penang from other states within Malaysia; visitors can easily fly in from Kedah (Langkawi), Johor (Johor Bahru), Sabah (Kota Kinabalu), Kelantan (Kota Bharu), and Sarawak (Kuching).

The Penang International Airport in Bayan Lepas is about to undergo an expansion. The expansion includes four phases and is expected to be completed in about 48 to 60 months. At present, the expansion project is on hold, pending the finalisation of the National Airport Strategic Plan (NASP). The NASP study on airport development is expected to be completed in 2023, in line with the National Transport Policy. The project is expected to increase passenger capacity from 6.5 million to 25 million a year.





## TRAVELLERS ESSENTIALS



### WEATHER

Penang enjoys a year-round tropical rainforest climate where it is warm and sunny all year round, with plentiful rainfall due to its geographical location and the monsoon climate. It is usually warmest in the months of January and February during the period of Chinese New Year, and rainy during the southwest monsoon from April to September. The climate is very much dictated by the surrounding sea and the

wind system. The average temperature is above 30°C in the day and above 25°C at night. The weather in Penang is suitable for strolls or cycling around the city, whether day or night.

### CULTURE

As a multicultural destination and a UNESCO World Heritage Site, it is difficult to define Penang in just one word. As such, knowing the local culture beforehand will help you understand Penang better.

#### Language

The official language of Malaysia is Malay, but many locals are proficient in English as well. Most Penangites are competent in more than two languages. Almost all Chinese speak 'Penang Hokkien' which is unique because of the blend of Chinese with many 'adopted' Malay words and some English words. Penangites' most common greeting is "Dah makan kah?" (Malay), "Chiak pa boi" (Hokkien), "Saptacha" (Tamil) which literally means "Have you eaten?".

Most signs are written in Malay and English, with some in Chinese. Names of roads and main destinations are in Malay as well. It would be helpful to know some basic Malay although English is widely spoken in many areas.

#### Fares for visitors

In Penang, quite a number of attractions offer subsidised fare for Malaysians. Visitors may notice the word "MyKad" stated on some price boards. MyKad refers to the Malaysian national identity card, where statements stating "Price for MyKad holders" refer to prices applicable to Malaysians. Entrance fees and fares are usually visibly displayed to avoid confusion. In the occasion where prices are not stated, do remember to check before proceeding.

#### Tipping Culture

Service charges are already included in places such as hotels and restaurants, so additional

tipping is not required. You may tip as a gesture of your appreciation for the services rendered.

#### Things to note during Ramadan

'Ramadan' is a major Muslim event that occurs during the ninth month of the Islamic calendar. Muslims fast daily from dawn to sunset and refrain from drinking water during this time. Out of respect for those fasting, try not to waste large amounts of food or behave imprudently in the presence of Muslims during Ramadan.

#### Things to note for pedestrians

Walking around George Town is common and is one of the best ways to tour this UNESCO heritage city to discover hidden delights like small quirky lanes. Traffic lights for pedestrians are available at most main streets. Pedestrians are advised to obey the pedestrian crossing lights for safety reasons.

#### Public Holidays

Penang is a multicultural society with people from different ethnicities and cultures. The city celebrates festivals that are linked to culture, religion and tradition, and observes public holidays that are in commemoration of events of national, regional or local importance. Please note that a particular holiday in Penang may not necessarily be a holiday in other states, and that the dates of certain festive holidays, especially those based on the lunar calendar may change from year to year.



## CURRENCY

The Malaysian currency is the Ringgit, written as **RM**. There are six denominations: RM 1, 5, 10, 20, 50, 100.



### Exchange

Money changers are widely present in George Town, shopping centres, and at the airport. Foreign currencies such as the US dollar cannot be used locally and it is advisable to purchase a small amount of local currency prior to your arrival.

Penang's financial district is right in the heart of George Town on Lebuh Pantai (Beach Street). Local and International banks can be found here as well as other locations in Penang for your banking purposes.

## SERVICES TELECOMMUNICATIONS

### Buying a SIM Card

A local SIM card can be purchased upon arrival at the airport. Simply choose from the different choices of telecommunication operators available. The retail stands are located at the arrivals hall, after you exit from the baggage claim area. Most convenience shops offer credit top-up services when your SIM card credit runs out.

### Wi-Fi

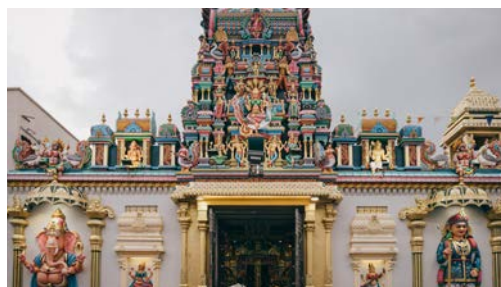
Penang has Wi-Fi networks befitting a tourist-friendly city. Wi-Fi is provided at the majority of the hotels and is available in most areas of the city. There are 1,550 Wi-Fi spots at tourist attractions and public places throughout George Town. Most cafés also offer free Wi-Fi. For convenience, you may purchase a local SIM card with a data package to access the internet at all times.





### PRAYER FACILITIES

The diversity of Penang means that Islam, Christianity, Hinduism, Sikhism, Buddhism and Taoism are well-represented in the community. There are many mosques, temples and churches in Penang for travellers to practise their beliefs freely and safely.



## GETTING AROUND PENANG



### LOCAL TRANSPORTATION

Downtown Penang is small enough in size for walking around, especially George Town and its surroundings. One can take in the sights in a trishaw or on a Link Bike. Alternatively, a free shuttle bus service, the Central Area Transit (CAT) bus, provides a convenient way of moving around town.

To get to attractions outside George Town – such as Kek Lok Si Temple, Penang Hill, Batu Ferringhi and Teluk Bahang – standard city buses and taxis are available, including e-hailing services. Always check schedules and fares before deciding on your preferred mode of transportation. Alternatively, you can also rent a car so you can get around at your own convenience.





### Public Bus

The state's public bus service is provided by Rapid Penang and covers an extensive area, both on the island and the mainland. It also offers a free Central Area Transit (CAT) bus service within George Town. The terminals at KOMTAR and Penang Sentral are the central transfer terminals for buses that ply the whole of Penang Island and Seberang Perai. Simply ask around or look out for signboards to find out which bus route serves you best. Upon boarding the Rapid Penang bus, inform the driver of your destination, pay the amount required and receive a ticket for your trip. Remember to prepare the exact change as all buses do not carry change for safety reasons.

\*Fares are based on distance travelled.

### Taxi

Taxis are commonly available around the island. It is an easy means of getting around by visitors. Be sure to agree on a price before boarding the taxi. Start by asking how much it is to get to your destination; you can negotiate on the pricing if you feel that it is too high.

### E-Hailing Services

Ridesharing apps such as Grab and AirAsia Ride are available in Penang. Simply download the apps to start booking your trips. Payment is either by cash or credit card.

### Car Rental Services

Most large car rental companies have offices in Penang, and a number of them have counters located at the airport. You can rent a car as soon as you arrive or book online and pick up the keys upon arrival. You can also rent a car with travel agencies, where you can book licensed tour guides and drivers to facilitate your visit.

### Trishaw

A great and breezy way of getting around George Town is by trishaw. Be sure to agree on a price before starting your journey – the average rate is RM50 per hour for two persons, depending on the distance between the start and end points.

### LinkBike

Link Bike is a bike-sharing system that allows users to pick up a bicycle at any of the 25 self-serve bike stations strategically located on the island and return it to any bike station at their convenience. Download the app and scan the QR code to release the bicycle. Users also can use the LinkBike Card instead of downloading the mobile app to use the service.

### Ferry

There are two types of ferry services: fast ferries (for pedestrians only) and vehicle ferries (for motorcycles and bicycles). The air-conditioned fast ferries serve the Pengkalan Sultan Abdul Halim (Butterworth) to Swettenham Pier Cruise Terminal (George Town) route while the vehicle ferries serve the Pengkalan Sultan Abdul Halim (Butterworth) to Pengkalan Raja Tun Uda (George Town) route. If you are taking a train to Penang from Kuala Lumpur or other cities, you may board the ferry to the island from Pengkalan Sultan Abdul Halim at Butterworth, located just next to the train station.

## CULTURE & HERITAGE

Hundreds of years ago, merchants and labourers sailed from faraway lands and laid anchor off Penang, to make their fortunes. They brought with them their own languages, customs and traditions. Today, the state evolved into a melting pot of cultures with a blend of eastern and western influences, evident by the different places of worship, architecture and more, found across the island and mainland.



### George Town UNESCO World Heritage Site



The George Town UNESCO World Heritage Site features Malaysia's best restored and re-adaptive traditional architecture and a multitude of heritage trades and arts. The world-renowned "Street of Harmony" reflects the influence of the diverse communities that have made Penang their home. The wooden houses over at the Clan Jetties are built on stilts over the sea and are a cherished and conserved element of George Town's cultural heritage legacy. At only 2.5sq km, the George Town World Heritage Site is compact enough to be explored on foot, by bicycle or trishaw.



### George Town's Outstanding Universal Values (OUVs)

According to UNESCO, the city represents an exceptional example of a multicultural trading town in South-East Asia forged from the mercantile and civilisation exchanges of Malay, Chinese, Indian and European influences. The city is a living testimony to Asia's multicultural heritage and traditions, where various religions and cultures meet. The city also reflects the coming together of cultural elements to create a unique architectural and cultural townscape unparalleled anywhere in East and South-East Asia.



### Penang Peranakan Culture

The Baba Nyonya or Peranakan Chinese are early immigrants from China. They openly adopted local beliefs and practices, resulting in a unique culture that is solely their own. One can find Peranakan culture in Malaysia in Penang and Melaka, but the Penang Peranakans differ from their Malaccan counterparts in some ways.

Although both Peranakans use a mixture of Hokkien and Malay languages, the Penang Peranakans speak mainly Hokkien with some borrowed Malay words. In contrast, the Malaccan Peranakans have adopted a Malay patois, with some Hokkien words included.

The Peranakan style of cooking fuses Chinese and Malay elements. There is an added Thai influence in the Peranakan cuisine in Penang, bringing in a sweet and sour edge that differentiates it from the Malaccan version. From rituals, cuisine, dressing to language, the Peranakan Chinese have created a fusion of cultures that stand as a true hallmark of Penang's rich multicultural diversity.

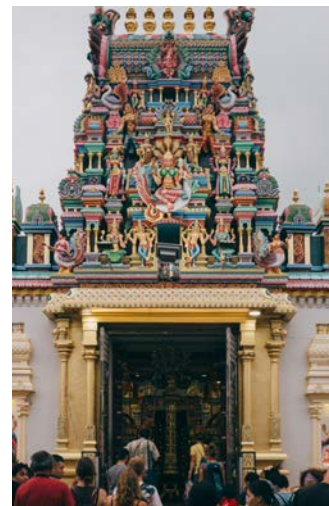

BEACHES

Penang is not only a culture and arts destination but offers numerous beaches as well. Majority of the beach resorts will usually have fun activities to join, or you can relax at a secluded spot to work on a tan. The very popular Batu Ferringhi or Tanjung Bungah beaches are well serviced with resorts, hotels and dining venues from fast food outlets to bars and restaurants. The less frequented Miami Beach lies not too far from the bustling Batu Ferringhi. Beaches in the Teluk Bahang area are accessible through boat rides or by hiking through the Penang National Park. Mas Beach and Kerachut Beach are perfect spots for a relaxing dip and a peaceful lie-down. In Balik Pulau, sun and sea breeze can be enjoyed at the Pantai Malindo and Pantai Pasir Panjang while Tanjung Asam, Ombak Damai and Pasir Belanda in the southwestern coast of the island have been drawing visitors. Over in Seberang Perai, beach spots like Pantai Robina, Pantai Bersih, and Bagan Ajam are popular with locals.





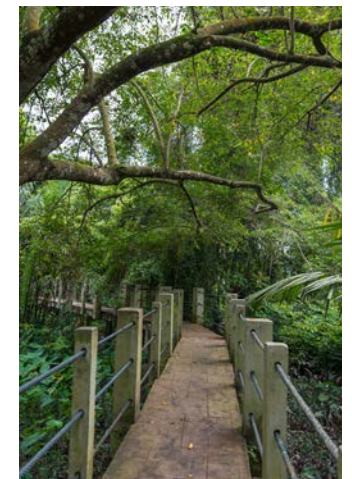


## ISLANDS

There are several smaller islands off the coasts of Penang Island and Seberang Perai. You might have heard of the more popular island Pulau Aman, but there are plenty more outlying islands like Pulau Tikus, which houses a solar-powered lighthouse and shrine of a holy man; Pulau Gedung, which hides a forgotten colonial weapons storage building; and Pulau Kendi, an uninhabited island with untouched natural beauty. These islands are only accessible by boat, which adds to their unique charms.

## RECREATIONAL SPACES

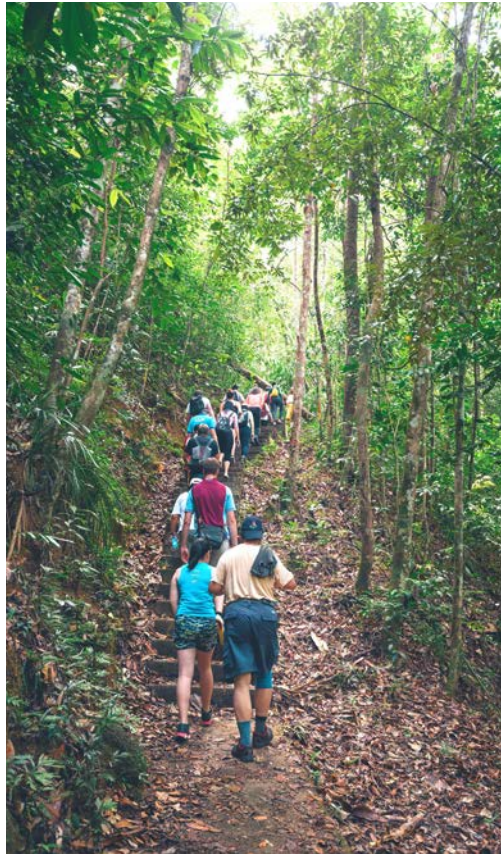

### HIKING

Penang is truly a hiker's paradise with its 130-million-year-old virgin rainforest and rugged landscapes. Some of the best hikes in the state are the trails leading up to Penang Hill, with the Moon Gate 5 trail near the Penang Botanic Gardens and Youth Park being one of the accessible trails. Travel further west to Penang National Park in Teluk Bahang if checking out baby sea turtles at the turtle sanctuary and discovering stunning beaches are on your hiking bucket list. Those seeking to end a hiking trip with wow-worthy waterfall views will do well at the Titi Kerawang hiking trail in Balik Pulau. Over on the mainland, Bukit Mertajam Recreational Park rewards hikers with a cooling breeze, some 450 metres above sea level, at its peak. Then, venture off to the park's splendid streams, shallow ponds and a waterfall, where you can enjoy a well-earned cool off after a day of hiking. Choose to follow a hiking guide or head out on one's own. Do pack plenty of food and water as some hikes contain limited to no facilities.



### GOLFING

Whether one chooses to tee off amid lush greenery or by the valley fringes, there are excellent golf courses that are designed to international standards. Penang is indeed an ideal destination that combines a memorable vacation with an exciting game of golf. Among the popular golf courses in the state are:

### CYCLING

Penang has some of the most beautiful hidden gems, landscapes, and towns, ready for you to explore on two wheels. Cycling is a breezy way to discover George Town's heritage buildings and its famous street art, as well as to take in Balik Pulau's stunning sights of kampungs, plantations, and fishing villages. Intrepid travellers seeking to spend a little time away from tourist spots can opt to cycle to Straits Quay or Queensbay on the scenic coastal lanes. If you are one for adventure, then the mainland's cycling routes must be on your bucket list. Ride along the Butterworth Outer Ring Road (BORR), passing by large container areas and gigantic container cranes before heading to Frog Hill. Getting to the top of the hill requires going through rough and patchy terrains, but the sweeping vistas atop the abandoned mining site are worth the ride. Rent a bike, join a cycling tour, or use a bike-sharing system like LinkBike – either way, you'll meet plenty of locals and see plenty of Penang's diverse landscapes as you cycle at a leisurely pace.

### FISHING

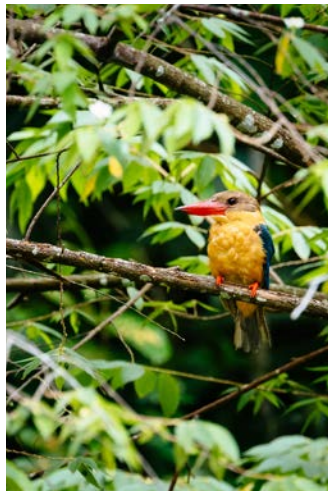
Fishing can be enjoyed along Penang's coastlines. Teeming with groupers, grunters, blackfin sea catfishes and croakers, the sea surrounding the Penang island is one of the best places to cast a line. For those who are after bigger fish, charter boats and tours take visitors to favourite fishing areas surrounding the island and the outlying islands off the coast of Seberang Perai.





### WATER SPORTS ACTIVITIES

Batu Ferringhi and Tanjung Bungah beaches are dotted with hotels, resorts and dining venues. One can easily opt to parasail or hop on a banana boat as recreational activities are in no shortage here. Do bear in mind that guests patronising waterfront facilities in Batu Ferringhi do so at their own risk. Those who enjoy kayaking and dragon boating can head over to Pusat Kegiatan Sukan Air (Water Sports Centre) in Tanjung Bungah. The centre is managed by the state government and it offers a variety of water sports, including dragon boating and kayaking.



### BIRDWATCHING

Penang is home to an estimated 420 species of birds, including several rare specimens. Both the island and mainland are known for its abundant variety of bird species, making it an avian paradise for amateur and experienced bird watchers. Some of the diverse bird habitats include lowland forests, mangrove forests, tidal mudflats, wetlands and paddy fields. Commonly spotted birds throughout Penang include various species of eagles, owls, song birds, waders and water birds that consist of resident and migrant birds.

## STREET ART

Street art is capturing the attention of global travellers and artists, fuelling a new kind of tourism that creatively connects travellers to the mishmash of cultures, heritage and arts that the city is buzzing. Through street art, art pieces are no longer confined in museums or galleries. Today, street art can be found thriving along the city's five-foot ways and pre-war shop houses, providing visitors glimpses of the state's history and cultural heritage. The heritage city of George Town's street art scene may be all the rage, but it's worth checking out other murals in Balik Pulau, Air Itam, Butterworth and Bukit Tambun too.





## EAT & DRINK



With its multiethnic populace, Penang offers a fantastic variety of food and a kaleidoscope of flavours. Not only are Asia's major races all represented in Penang's cuisine, but they are also fused in the forms that are truly unique to Penang, like Nyonya and Jawi Peranakan cooking. Nyonya cuisine is a blend of Malay, Chinese and Thai influences, while Jawi Peranakan food is a product of the Indian-Muslim, Straits-born community, which combines Tamil, Pakistani, Persian, and Malay cooking styles. From a choice of traditional hawker stalls to old-school coffee shops and fine dining establishments, the only dilemma is deciding where to eat that next great meal.

### STREET FOOD

Penang's hawkers are well regarded for their mastery of the hawker traditions. A majority of hawkers in Penang boast their own family recipe perfected over generations. Over time, Penang's hawker culture has gained numerous global recognitions. One of the best ways to enjoy Penang's internationally acclaimed street food like assam laksa and char koay teow and other must-eats like curry mee, hokkien mee, or chien and pasembur under one roof is by dining in at a coffee shop or food court. ## FESTIVALS & EVENTS



The people in Penang celebrate all year round festivals including religious, cultural and arts. They happen almost every month such as the acrobatic lion dances during Chinese New Year, the intricate weaving of ketupat (rice dumplings) during Hari Raya Aidilfitri (Eid Mubarak) and the unbelievable body piercings that are seen during Thaipusam (a Hindu religious festival). Besides these, home-grown arts festivals are increasingly popular with global travellers such as the highly-anticipated George Town Festival and the international award-winning George Town Literary Festival. Other annual events such as the Catholic St Anne's Feast Day, Penang International Food Festival, George Town Festival, George Town Heritage Celebration, Penang Bridge International Marathon and Penang International Dragon Boat Festival are not to be missed in Penang.





## ANNUAL EVENTS



### **PENANG CNY CELEBRATION (MIAO HUI)** **JANUARY - FEBRUARY**

Penang CNY Celebration (Miao Hui) is an annual event held during CNY to showcase and promote Chinese traditional culture. This year, the celebration is held on both online and offline platforms for all to participate.

### **PENANG INTERNATIONAL FOOD FESTIVAL** **JUNE**

The Penang International Food Festival (PIFF) is an annual event offering visitors an exciting experience to indulge in Penang's famed Food. Presenting endless delectable choices, PIFF is the place for food, stories, experience, culture and traditions.

### **PENANG HILL FESTIVAL** **JULY**

With the theme "See the Nature, Feel the History", Penang Hill Festival is a three-day event that aims to offer educational sessions and opportunity to public to enjoy the beauty of Penang Hill and its culture and history while celebrating Penang Hill's latest designation as a Biosphere Reserve by UNESCO Man and the Biosphere Program.

### **PENANG INTERNATIONAL FLOWER, FRUIT & FOOD FESTIVAL** **JULY**

Penang International Flower, Fruit & Food Festival is an event that offers selling of local food, fruits, flowers shows and more.

### **GEORGE TOWN FESTIVAL** **JULY**

George Town Festival (GTF) is an annual festival held in Penang, in honour of the city's designation as a UNESCO World Heritage Site in 2008. This year's Festival is reimagined and curated as a hybrid festival, integrating traditional forms of on-site entertainment with modern virtual elements.

### **GEORGE TOWN HERITAGE CELEBRATIONS** **JULY**

George Town Heritage Celebrations is an annual community-powered event that commemorates the inscription of George Town as a UNESCO World Heritage Site on 7 July 2008. It celebrates the living heritage of George Town – its multicultural practices, food, arts, and crafts, as well as cultural festivities that highlight the history and local cultural pride.

### **PENANG BRIDGE INTERNATIONAL MARATHON** **DEC**

The Penang Bridge International Marathon or Penang Bridge Marathon is an annual marathon event held at Penang Bridge in Penang, Malaysia, since 1984. It is organised by Penang State Tourism Development office and fully supported by the Penang State Government. It is known as the biggest run in the country.

## CULTURAL EVENTS



### PONGAL CELEBRATION JANUARY

Pongal is a harvest festival celebrated by Hindus, usually in January or February, when crops like paddy and sugarcane are harvested.

### THAIPUSAM JANUARY / FEBRUARY

Thaipusam is a religious occasion held by devotees for the purpose of seeking blessings, fulfilling vows, and offering thanks to Lord Murugan.

### CHINESE NEW YEAR JANUARY / FEBRUARY

Chinese New Year is celebrated on the first day of the Lunar Calendar, with each year ushering in a zodiac animal ruling sign. Celebrations start on the eve of Chinese New Year where family members gather for a Reunion Dinner.

### NUZUL AL-QURAN MARCH / APRIL

On the 17th day of the holy Ramadan month, a national-level celebration called Nuzul Al-Quran is held to commemorate the day Prophet Muhammad S.A.W. first received the revelation from heaven. It is observed as a public holiday in most states of Malaysia.

### VAISAKHI APRIL

Vaisakhi marks the harvest festival and the start of the Punjabi New Year. The occasion is observed by the Sikh community with prayers in Sikh temples.

### THAI WATER FESTIVAL (SONGKRAN) APRIL

Songkran or Water Festival is a traditional festival celebrated by Thai and Burmese devotees to mark the beginning of a New Year. It is celebrated by liberally splashing water on each other.

### HARI RAYA AIDILFITRI APRIL / MAY

In Malaysia, the Muslims celebrate the start of the month of Syawal with their families and friends. It marks the end of a month-long fasting during Ramadan.

### WESAK DAY MAY

Wesak Day is observed by devotees to celebrate Buddha's birthday, enlightenment and achievement of Nirvana. The occasion is observed by devotees with prayers in temples.

### AWAL MUHARRAM JULY

Also known as Maal Hijrah, it marks the first day in the Islamic Calendar (Hijrah Calendar). It is equivalent to the 1st of January in the Gregorian Calendar. In most states, it is gazetted as a public holiday.

### HUNGRY GHOST FESTIVAL AUGUST

It is believed to be when the Gates of Hell are opened for spirits and ghosts to roam freely. Makeshift altars are erected at roadsides where giant joss sticks are lit and food offered. Staged operas are also conducted for the entertainment of ghosts, spirits, and the public on a nightly basis.

### MERDEKA DAY AUGUST

To commemorate Malaysia's Independence Day, an annual Merdeka Parade will be organised by the Penang State Government where contingents representing various government agencies will be taking part in the occasion.

### MID-AUTUMN FESTIVAL SEPTEMBER

Mid-Autumn Festival is celebrated widely in Penang. It is a time when family and friends gather to admire the full moon while savouring Moon Cakes, Chinese tea and parading around with colourful Chinese Lanterns.

### MALAYSIA DAY SEPTEMBER

A significant date in the history of Malaysia as it marks the joining together of Malaya, Sabah and Sarawak to form Malaysia in 1963.

### NINE EMPEROR GODS FESTIVAL SEPTEMBER / OCTOBER

The Nine Emperor Gods Festival is celebrated on the 1st till 9th day of the ninth month in the lunar calendar. Throughout this festival, rituals such as skewering and fire walking ceremonies are carried out. On the last day, the Gods are sent off to the sea accompanied by many other colourful floats.

### NAVRATRI FESTIVAL SEPTEMBER / OCTOBER

The Navratri Festival is a Hindu religious festival. For 9 days, devotees pray to the Goddess Durga, Goddess Lakshmi and Goddess Saraswathy in hopes of being bestowed with power, wealth, and education.

### DEEPAVALI NOVEMBER

This colourful festival is also known as "The Festival of Lights" and is celebrated by Hindus all around the world. Oil lamps are lit and decorated in their homes on Deepavali morning as a way of thanking the Gods for happiness, knowledge, peace, and wealth.

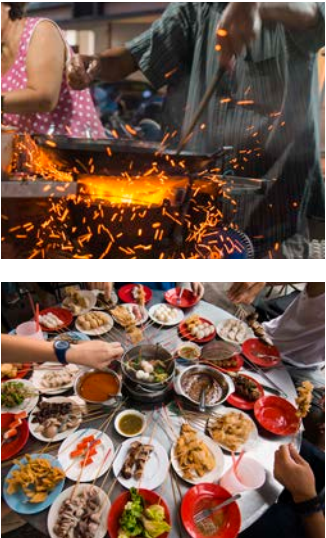
